


Funding Sources

An Intergenerational Impact

StepUp Ministry works across generations to provide pathways to stability for our participants. Just ask Patrick Bryant, Life Skills 2023 graduate; or his mother, Elaine Bryant-Donigan, Life Skills 2014 graduate and former StepUp employee; or his sister, Brianna Donigan, 2023 Real World Program graduate. "StepUp is a part of our family brand," Patrick shares.

Patrick was approaching life without a strategy or vision: "My mentality was out of sight, out of mind. I was winging life." Encouraged by his mother, Patrick eventually decided to enroll in the Life Skills Program. The program taught him how to set boundaries and build financial management skills. "Learning how to effectively budget helped me not only foreshadow the future, but also address the leaks in my finances." Additionally, Patrick deepened his self-awareness and developed a road map towards becoming his best self.

Today you will find Patrick and his family thriving. Patrick is currently a full-time entrepreneur and happily married. His mom, Elaine, works for Durham County, and his sister will be attending Denison University on a full scholarship.

It is on a daily basis that Patrick uses skills first learned at StepUp. Now Patrick is no longer winging life: he instead approaches it with tenacity, with his mom and sister by his side.



Employment Academy Bootcamp

The first step in creating stability in one's life begins with steady and consistent employment. This past year, due to vast fluctuations in the employment landscape, we began piloting changes to our jobs program. We pivoted from a week-long workshop to a two-day Employment Academy Bootcamp, where skills such as conducting a viable job search and networking, creating an effective resume, and interview skills are taught.

To better serve our justice-involved participants, we also provided outreach to the North Carolina prison

system. This included conducting 'mini bootcamps' at Butner Federal Corrections and NCC Institution for Women. These bootcamps involved classes surrounding the articulation of incarceration, job searching, resume writing, and building interview skills.

We also re-launched our ENER-G Program (Employment Networking, Empowerment Resources & Growth). The ENER-G Program provides a deeper dive into job readiness skills while also teaching the importance of financial literacy. "The Employment Academy really

Our Youngest Participants

Our Children's Program was created and launched in 2008 and mirrors the Life Skills Program by including 48 weeks of age-appropriate education and mentoring support for children six weeks to 22 years old. StepUp tracks each child's development through individual development plans (IDPs). IDP evaluations cover the areas of academics and behavioral, social, and emotional learning. Last year, 78% of children enrolled in our program showed IDP improvement at graduation.

Our staff are certified trainers of Triple P, an evidencebased Positive Parenting program. This includes parental training and coaching on how to become strong role models and advocates for children.

Shaquanna Williams, 2023 Life Skills graduate and mother of four, recognized the need for stability in her home and thus decided to enroll in the Life Skills Program. "Each Tuesday night I learned something new about myself and my kids. My kids learned how to express their feelings and that it's okay to set boundaries." In fact, Shaquanna's 8-year-old daughter, Amonie–2023 Children's Program graduate—created a goal to become more outgoing and was proud to share when she met that goal. Amonie also really enjoyed earning StepUp Bucks for her good behavior and goal achievement. She was able to use those Bucks at the StepUp Store. This experience taught Amonie how to earn and save money and then spend it on fun stuff.

StepUp's tiniest participants begin their StepUp journey in the Children's Program. It is there that kiddos like Amonie learn that a life shaped by goal-oriented choices truly pays off!
